SAPD SPEAKER SERIES



Sharing Knowledge

My grandfather, Stanley B James, was an Englishman who came to Jumping Pound in 1893. Here in London, I am busy writing a book about his life and, because he, too, was a writer and penned two autobiographies, I have a lot of information about him. But, because he was rather vague about the facts of his adventurous life, I felt I needed to pin him down a bit more.

His four years in Alberta were particularly unclear, so in May 2019 I hopped on a plane and spent a couple of weeks researching his time as a cowboy in the region. I

made some contacts before setting out so I could maximize my short time in Canada. Through Bev Copithorne of the Jumping Pound Community Hall, I was put in touch with the Southern Alberta Pioneers, who I came to visit within 10 hours of flying in. I drove bleary-eyed to their Monday morning get-together at the Memorial Building in Calgary and was warmly greeted.

Kathleen Rogers hosted me and couldn't have been more welcoming. Strictly speaking, the 23-year-old Stanley wasn't even a pioneer – for two reasons: he arrived after 1890 and he wasn't a settler as such but one of the many impoverished Brits – he definitely wasn't a remittance man – who escaped to these beautiful foothills, seeking

freedom and adventure. But it didn't seem to matter to the SAP Pioneers that he wasn't really a pioneer; they were just willing to help me out with some live research. They were also generous enough to make me a present of a beautiful book, *Our Foothills*, which now sits proudly on my research shelf in my study back in London.

Kathleen had arranged to take me to see John and Beryl Sibbald, who live off the Hermitage Road in Rockyview District. Having identified Stanley in three photos taken in Jumping Pound in 1893, it was clear that my grandfather

had worked side by side with John Sibbald's grandfather in those early days. And, thanks to all those smart introductions – the Pioneers seemed to know instinctively who I needed to meet before I did – those connections happened time and again during my trip. None of it could have happened without the very special Western hospitality I received from the SAP Pioneers. It is something I shall never forget.

And now those gaps in my story have been well and truly filled. It puts meat on the ranching bone of my story and is all the better for that. Thank you to everyone – you really are 21st century Pioneers!

The Centennial Memorial Gate

Following the 1955 completion, of the Memorial Building celebrating the Provincial Jubilee, the Men's and Women's Pioneer Associations began to work toward amalgamation. The first combined meeting was held in October of 1964 and one of the first orders of business was to find a project to celebrate Canada's 100th birthday.

Mrs. A. C. Smith chaired the first meeting of the Centennial Committee in June of 1965. The committee drafted a questionnaire listing four proposals and sent it out to all members of the Society. A table was set up and manned by the committee at Fort Calgary House during Stampede week. The committee provided literature on the proposals, solicited support, pledges, and gained feedback from the members. In July of that year the committee reported that the survey had shown that over 50% favoured the proposal to build a gate to include a suitable memorial to the Old Timers, such as a bronze plaque on which would be listed the names of all original Pioneers or Pioneer families. In the early part of 1967, a letter was sent by Stuart Grayson, chair of the Centennial Committee, to members and Friends of the Pioneers requesting donations for the Centennial Gate Project. Surplus would be devoted to the beautification of the grounds.

The Memorial Gate was dedicated on Sunday, July 9, 1967, with the ceremonial rawhide ribbon being cut with scissors brought to Calgary by the Shaw family in 1883. The brass plaques were not yet ready, but Calgary Stamp and Pencil had provided a temporary list of names on heavy paper which was temporarily attached to the gate.

"The archway bears, on its outer (easterly) face, two plaques: one, a simple dedication to our pioneers, and the other a listing of the signatories of Treaty No. 7. The inner faces of the archway bear plaques perpetuating in bronze the names of one thousand and fifty heads of original Pioneer families settling in Southern Alberta before the end of 1890."

In 1988, a committee was appointed under Lucille Togs tad to gather and research further names for a brass plaque


on the north-west side of the gate. After three years of hard work, a dedication service was held in 1991 following the annual Memorial Service held the first Sunday of Stampede. Stephanie Ferguson piped the tunes "Amazing Grace."

The initial arch way of the gate was constructed of wood, with a painted sign "Southern Alberta Pioneers Old Timers Association." This archway fell victim to an over height delivery truck in the early 2000's. Bob Brewster was Building committee chair at the time, and saw the replacement project through to completion. His first thought was to have a wrought iron arch of a proper height built depicting western silhouettes. He phoned the City to find the correct height and talked to Mr. Wrought Iron about his ideas. He visited the Glenbow Museum and the Calgary Library to collect the right type of western pictures for the silhouettes. The final images chosen were a farmer and his dog, and a woman and child to be at the base of the arch; with images of a tipi, a dray wagon, a cowboy herding cattle, a Red River cart, and a NWMP depicted within the arch. Bob chose to have the Mountie wear a Stetson Cowboy Hat as this was the hat actually worn by members of the Force while on patrol despite not being officially adopted until 1901. (Originally, the NWMP wore the Foreign Service pith helmet, made of cork covered in cloth, and the pill box cap for undress, to suit their image as a paramedical force).

The images needed to be computerized and sized, and then Bob met with Helen Mackie at Mr. Wrought Iron to determine the placing of the images. Helen provided sketches of various configurations for the shape of the archway. The wrought-iron archway was finally installed in the fall of 2002 on the stone Centennial Memorial gate posts.

Ten years later the gate received further upgrading thanks to a generous donation by Bob Rintoul, which allowed the completion of the electric gate with the Buffalo Head we now have.

Next time you enter the grounds, look up to the silhouettes and locate your family name on the plaques.





High Rider

Bill Gallagher



Many of the stories about the discovery and settlement of our province – and the proud civilizations that existed here long before we did – are so rich that they need no embellishment. And indeed, the most incredible stories are often the ones that are true to the life. But with all of the historic events that our home has witnessed through the centuries, it has always rather surprised me that we don't have more historical fiction set in southern Alberta, with our local creative voices imagining and filling in the tantalizing gaps in the things that we "know." Writer Bill Gallagher has done just that and created a narrative around one of our most beloved historical figures.

As the end of the nineteenth century neared, southern Alberta and its fledgling communities were attracting immigrants from all over the world. What we often forget about is just how close to home some of those immigrants were, with many coming over the border from the United States. For example, veterans of the civil war, with both sides of that bloody and deadly conflict represented, are buried in Calgary's Union Cemetery.

John Ware's life had been formed and shaped by the events that had racked the country of his birth, but of course he had fought for neither side. He was born a slave on a plantation in southern Carolina, and it is here that Bill Gallagher introduces him to us. Gallagher makes you feel as though you are beside John Ware as he walks

Memorial Building Upgrade Report

The Memorial Building Capital Upgrade Project comprises of a complete makeover of the buildings electrical and mechanical systems (including air conditioning) and partial upgrade of the plumbing and fire protection systems.

This upgrade is urgently required for the following reasons:

- 1. The building infrastructure is inadequate to meet the demands for member, public and private functions.
- 2. The buildings Electrical, Plumbing and Mechanical systems do not meet present City of Calgary building codes.
- 3. Electrical system is currently at full capacity due to new high technical gear such as computers and audio/visual equipment.
- 4. Plumbing does not meet commercial grades.
- 5. Building furnaces are too small and in constant repair.
- 6. Air circulation is inadequate plus there is no air conditioning.

The scope of work for the upgrade includes, but not limited to:

- 1. Two new Furnaces with Make-up air and Air Conditioning.
- 2. New 60 Gallon Hot Water Tank.
- 3. Replace all basement ductwork.
- 4. Replace Bathroom fixtures and plumbing to current commercial grades.
- 5. New electrical panels and complete rewiring of electrical circuits.
- 6. Replace all light fixtures with LED Lighting and rewire existing wagon wheel chandeliers to code.
- 7. Reconfigure basement kitchen to make room for expanded mechanical room.
- 8. Refurbishment of the main hall hardwood floor.
- 9. New fire alarm panel.
- 10. ENMAX power hook-up.

The only architectural changes made to the building are in the lower level where the furnace room requires expansion which means the downstairs kitchen will be a little smaller and the downstairs hall walls and ceiling will be replaced with drywall with wainscoting on the bottom portion of the walls. The upstairs architecture will not change.

The planning of this project has been ongoing now for about three years initiated by Joan Hampaul (former SAPD Building Committee Chair) with collaboration with the City of Calgary (our leaseholder), IBI Group (Architect's) and Project Manager, Jason Moroz from Three Peaks Group.

Construction was originally planned for January to March of 2019 but was deferred a year because only two bids were received (out of six solicitated) with these bids being about \$100,000 apart. Delaying the project was a prudent thing as it provided more time to plan and to secure government funding.

On May 27, The City of Calgary re-engaged IBI Group (who are contracted to the City) to restart the project. The project went out to Tender to seven Contractor's on July 23, 2019 with a closing date of August 20, 2019. A mandatory site visit was conducted on July 30 and a follow-up visit on Aug 6. Six compliant bids were received.

The bids were analysed and at the time of this writing a Contractor has ben short listed, the award of the contract is pending on the city's final approval to proceed expected to be received the week of Sep 22, 2019. Once the approval is received a Contract will be executed between Southern Alberta Pioneers Foundation (SAPF) and the selected Contactor.

Outside of the scope of the main contract is the upgraded power feed line (400 Amp) from the street to the building, this work is performed by ENMAX (we have no choice). ENMAX was engaged by SAPF on August 19 to commence this work.

NEXT STEPS

- 1. Award Main Construction Contract (first week of October).
- 2. Presentation of the Project during the AGM, Oct 19.
- 3. Remove all furniture, appliances books, artifacts, pictures, animal heads etc. from the building and move into storage. This can be a gradual process but must be completed before Contractor starts demolition.
- 4. Contractor to have a "soft" mobilization by Dec 2 to satisfy requirements of the Building Permit. From Dec 2 to Dec 22 (last rental) the building will be fully functional.
- 5. From Dec 22 to Dec 31, 2020 all remaining items in the building must be removed including the audio/visual equipment which will be removed by Big Guy Productions, the company that supplied the system.
- 6. Ian 1 to March 31 Construction Period.

PROJECT BUDGET

This is the un-approved budget at the time of writing. GST is not included, as a non-profit charitable organization, GST payments will be rebated.

FUNDING AND GOVERNMENT GRANTS

Government Grants for this type of work are available from both the Province of Alberta through their Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP) and through the City of Calgary through their Capital Conservation Grant (CCG).

The following is the status of the Gov't Grants that we applied for:

Due to the Alberta Government budget cuts and austerity program the chance for the 2020 CFEP Grant to be approved is doubtful, we should know sometime in November.

Assuming it is not successful the SAPF will have to cover nearly \$200,000 of its own costs to complete the work.

Options to cover this cost are:

- Borrowing funds from the bank
- Draw from the Memorial Building Fund
- Raise money through donations and other fund-raising initiatives.
 - We received a generous donation from Barbara Depaoli for \$10,000
 - Another donation for \$10,000 was submitted on the condition it is used for the removal and storage of the artifacts by a qualified contractor.

At the AGM on October 19 a presentation will be made on the project followed by a Question and Answer period. In the meantime please forward any questions to:

Stampede BBQ, July, 6, 2019

What a night! At about 4:00 it looked as though it was going to be clear sailing regarding the weather. The temperature got up to around 22 degrees so, it was perfect for a Stampede BBQ.

Everything was pretty much set up outdoors for the onslaught of members to begin festivities after going through the gates to be branded by the Stampede Promotion Committee. The fiddler was on hand to serenade as one entered and either went into the building to get their tickets from Rhonda Hutchings and her side kick Bev Prieur; or wander to the tent area to purchase beverage tickets from Roy, Gordon or Cindy Burke. Gwen Hanna who has looked after ticket sales for many years was generous in her wonderful guidance, insight and mentorship to Rhonda.

Black clouds were looming to the west and were looking pretty ominous. Conversation quickly centered around when the storm was going to begin, then pass over; to moving the caterer, Duncan Kesslering, with the help of his crew, into the basement for serving over 200 guests. It was decided to wait until 6:00 before a big move. Kathleen Rogers, Megan Ballard, Jeff Hill and some of Duncan's crew frantically held the tent poles at bay so they wouldn't depart overhead with the wind.
