Highlights of Proposed Bylaw Changes

embers will be asked to vote on proposed SAPD Bylaw changes at this year's AGM. The changes in the bylaws are needed to meet the AGLC (Alberta Gaming, Liquor and Cannabis Commission) charitable group eligibility requirements so we can maintain a significant source of funding for our historical programs. The following are highlights of key changes. Proposed new text is red and proposed deleted text is struck through.

Article I. DEFINING AND INTERPRETING THE BYLAWS

Voting Privilege - Any Descendant, Associate or Friend Member can vote at any meeting of the Society with the exception of:

- Members who have withdrawn from membership
- Members who are in arrears in payment of annual fees
- Members who are currently suspended
- Members who have been expelled

Article III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 3.02—Associate Member

- (b) Rights and Responsibilities
 - Has voting privileges on all matters pertaining to the Society
 - ii. May be elected to the Board of Directors
 - iii. May be elected (or appointed) to the Executive following being an elected member of the Board of Directors for 12 prior months
 - iv. May sit on any standing committee
 - v. Agrees to abide by the Objects of the Society
 - vi. No voting privileges
 - vii. May be nominated to the Board of Directors, and if elected, will have the full rights of a Descendant member during the Associate's tenure as a Director including holding office in the Society, except for the office of President or Vice-President. The combined number of Associate Members and Friend Members on the

Section 3.03—Friend Member

Article IX. BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

Section 9.01

(a) The Executive Officers of the Society shall consist of the Immediate Past President and the following elected members: President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Membership Secretary and Treasurer, all of whom shall be Members in good standing of the Society. One Executive Officer of the Society (to a maximum of 25% of the Executive) may be appointed by the elected Directors.

President Shawn and First Lady Nicole at the **Calgary Stampede Display Western Showcase,** July 7 - 16. The SAPD display focussed on Disasters and Recovery. This event is supported by our Historical Committee: Carolyn Preston, Kathleen Rogers, Dave Wake, Marcel Hebert, Russell Moore, Doug Coats and Alan Lynas.

We reduced the number of hours in manning the display this year by 2 hours and went from 4 shifts per day to 3 shifts, and were able to have at least 2 volunteers on each shift except for 3 shifts. Approximately 60 persons volunteered over the 10 days with some taking up to 3 shifts.

We kept an approximate log on numbers attending and can confirm that at least 2000 persons visited the booth over the 10 day period.



SAPD Remembers Alberta Historian

On Saturday, July 23, Alan Lynas, Historical Committee, represented SAPD at the memorial service of Dr. Hugh Dempsey (1929-2022), which was held at Fort Calgary.



Dr. Dempsey was called the Dean of Alberta historians for his work as journalist, author and chronicler of the history of the Blackfoot people. He also served as chief curator emeritus of the Glenbow Museum.

Gathering of the Godlontons

n the late 1880s, four brothers left England for Canada; James, George, Thomas and John. They were soon followed by their cousin Frederick. The brothers all settled in and around Calgary Fred settled in the Southwestern corner of Saskatchewan. Amazingly, the majority of the generations to follow have stayed in somewhat the same areas.

In July 2020, a small group of cousins were talking about days gone by—when the families would all gather together for Sunday dinner, camping trips and special occasions—when they realized that it had been a very long time since we had one of those gatherings and how we needed to get together sooner rather than later. That's when my husband, Jim, volunteered to make it happen.

As Jim and I drove home, still discussing a family get together, we decided that we needed to see how many family members from the four brothers and one cousin we could find. We set the date for August 2021, as we were confident that this thing called COVID would be long gone. Well, COVID had other plans and we had to postpone to 2022.

Over the next two years, we planned and searched for family members. Luckily, there had been a Godlonton Reunion in 2002 and those who had planned and attended that reunion were all amazing in helping to make our plans come true. We organized a full long weekend reunion; some people camped out and some just travelled each day.

Well, July 29, 2022 came faster than I could imagine. It was so exciting to see family members start pulling into our yard in Magrath, AB with their trailers and vehicles. We soon had introductions being made and the fun began.


Members of the different family lines all contributed displays of pictures and genealogy sheets and other items. Unfortunately, some of the family lines couldn't be represented in person, but we felt them in the different items they had sent earlier.

We started Friday evening with a big bonfire and wiener roast along with celebrating a 12-year-old's birthday.

Saturday was for getting to know new family members and reacquainting with family that hadn't seen each other in forever. Most played yard games together and had a huge slip'n'slide for those younger at heart. We supplied the lunch and the meat for the suppers while everyone brought other items to share with the meals. Afterwards, the fire pit was lit and those who wished to could continue to visit around the fire late into the evening.

Sunday began with a pancake breakfast and was a repeat of Saturday, with the additional option to golf at the Magrath Golf Course. Monday morning we gathered for a sausage breakfast before we all said our goodbyes.

Our reunion was a success of epic proportions; we were humbled with the



love and friendship that was so apparent. It was heartwarming to see the younger ones who had begged to not have to come at all ... they didn't know anyone so it was going to be so boring ... almost in tears as they begged to stay longer. It was unanimous, that we need to do this again and a lot sooner than 20 years. Everyone was so interested in each other and in the genealogy showing how we were all connected to each other.

Our son mentioned how interesting it was to see how similar each family is; we all have similar hobbies and likes and dislikes and, amazingly, so many have the same occupations that the four brothers and one cousin originally had. I've heard it said, that "we are who we are because they were who they were" and I believe it to be true. I truly believe that the most important thing in life isn't a thing, it's family, and Jim and I feel so blessed to have been able to host this family reunion.
